DEAR FRIENDS,

As another school year comes to a close, we are inspired by the stories of persistence and achievement from our students. These stories are only possible because of partners like you across so many different Colorado communities. Through our programs, CYC continues to work every day to close opportunity gaps for vulnerable youth who face complex barriers to completing their education.

Our Reengagement and Futures Academy programs continued to reenroll students who dropped out of school across three districts, helping over 400 of them find a new path toward graduation and post-secondary opportunities.

The Educational Intervention program, which works with 9th graders failing at least one course, began gathering data on entire 9th grade classes, vs. just the CYC cohort, to better create systems change within partnering high schools. CYC's Corps for a Change program also saw gains in engagement, leveraging the power of AmeriCorps members while helping high school students who were considered chronically absent.

In looking at our youngest learners in the Colorado Reading Corps program, we were pleased to see almost 70% exceeding their target growth rate in literacy to become strong readers by the end of 3rd grade. The quote below perfectly summarizes the impact of this program:

"The program is an invaluable resource for us. With Reading Corps, we are able to provide one-on-one reading support for students who are a little behind in reading but not far enough behind to qualify for other support services. We can support students before they start to really struggle and begin to dislike reading." 2018-2019 teacher at partnering site

1,327 students were served by 61 AmeriCorps tutors.

68% of students achieved more than a full year of academic growth in reading.

153 students were served.

67% of students that reenrolled in school finished the year with a positive outcome: graduation or continued enrollment into the next school year.

Staff reached out to 4,271 out-of-school youth and helped reenroll 417 students.

42% of students within the target group increased their attendance, compared to an average decline in overall school attendance of 5% over the year.

331 failing classes were recovered and became passing, and 88% of students raised at least one core failing grade.

65 students co-enrolled in post-secondary options; 28 earned credit from Pickens Technical College and 16 earned credit from the Community College of Aurora.

155 students passed at least one GED test and 57 earned a GED.


479 students were served by 18 AmeriCorps members.

357 students were served.


STUDENT SUCCESS • Jaheim spent most of his middle school in online classes, so when he got to high school he was having a hard time ignoring the distractions of the classroom. After poor attendance and a behavioral problem that caused him to end up in court, he didn't know where to go. Then he met Nakato, a Reengagement Specialist at CYC. With her help Jaheim enrolled in a new school, recovered his lost credits and found a new emotional and support system. As one of 13 kids in his family, he will be the first to graduate at the end of 2019, and he hopes to continue his education by learning how to code.
