End of Year Report 2018-2019



The mission of CYC is to solve Colorado's dropout crisis. CYC was established in 2005 in response to more than 18,000 students dropping out of Colorado schools each year, and the lack of resources in school systems to prevent youth from dropping out and reenroll those who had. Since that time, CYC has significantly contributed to the dropout rate being cut nearly in half.

CYC is a recognized leader in dropout prevention and student reengagement, providing youth with academic support, evidence-based interventions, family engagement, and wraparound support services to address non-academic barriers to education. CYC programs address early warning signs of dropping out (low reading proficiency, chronic absenteeism, and course failure), as well as reengage disconnected, out-of-school youth, getting them back on a path to graduation and post-secondary opportunities. CYC works every day to close opportunity gaps for thousands of vulnerable youth in our community.

While the four-year Colorado graduation rate has made significant gains in the past ten years, to 80.7% (2018), and the dropout rate has been nearly cut in half, one in five Colorado students are still not completing a high school diploma on time, or at all. Moreover, profound achievement gaps continue to persist for economically disadvantaged students and students of color. Only 70.7% of students who qualified for free and reduced lunch graduated in 2018, and only 73.4% of Hispanic/Latino students and 74.4% of Black/African American students graduated, compared to more than 85% of white students. Dropout rates also show disparities, with more than twice as many students of color dropping out than white students, and three to four times as many students experiencing homelessness and in foster care dropping out, compared to their peers (Colorado Department of Education, 2018).

CYC Programming falls into three categories:

- 1. Prevention
- 2. Reengagement
- 3. Futures Academy


Helping students become strong readers by the end of the 3rd Grade

- 1,327 students were served by the Colorado Reading Corps program
- 68 percent achieved more than a full year of academic growth in reading
- 265 students were reading at grade level and exited from the program
- 28,813 tutoring hours were provided with an average of 3.4 sessions a week
- Students were served in 8 districts, 59 schools, and by 61 tutors

Corps for a Change

Maintain or increase student attendance within the school year

- 479 students were served by the Corps for a Change program
- 274 students were in the *target* group and had 70 to 90 percent attendance in the first 30 days
- 205 students were identified by school partners as needing support
- 7,404 meetings and contacts were made by AmeriCorps Members
- 42 percent of students within the *target* group increased their attendance
- Students were served in 8 school districts, 14 schools and by 18 members

Educational Intervention

Help 9th graders get on track to graduation by passing core classes

- 153 students were served by the Educational Intervention Program
- 88 percent of students raised at least one core failing grade
- 331 failing classes were recovered and became passing
- 50 students passed all their core classes
- 60 percent of the students finished the year on-track to graduation
- Students were served in 2 school districts, 3 schools and by 3 staff members

Reengagement

Reenroll students who have left school without graduating

- 5,592 students were on Outreach Caseloads
- 4,163 students, who did not enroll, were given a Final Outreach Status (FOS)
- 549 students were served by the Reengagement program
- 417 students were enrolled back into school or a GED program
- Students were served in 3 school districts by 7 staff members

Examples of final outreach statuses include "found enrolled", "not interested", and "moved". CYC provides this information to the school district to help improve understanding around students who leave school early.

Futures Academy

Students earn their GED while co-enrolled in post-secondary options

- 357 students were served by Futures Academy
- 264 students took a Pre-GED or GED Test over the course of the year
- 191 students were enrolled at the end of the school year
- 57 students earned their GED
- 49 percent of *testing* students increased a test score
- Students were served in Aurora Public Schools by 13 staff members

APPENDIX A CYC PROGRAM OVERVIEW

CYC programming falls into three areas. This programming represents a spectrum that begins as early as elementary school and ends in community college. CYC is committed to both preventative programming and reengagement programming.

| Colorado Reading Corps: The Reading Corps model is a replication of the highly successful Minnesota Reading Corps. Trained tutors (AmeriCorps members) provide one-on-one, 20 minute, daily literacy interventions to kindergarten through third grade students performing below grade level in reading to get them on track. Corps for a Change: AmeriCorps Members provide support to high school students with 70-90% attendance. They work collaboratively with school staff. Members check attendance daily, make phone calls and home visits, and provide resources to remove barriers to students attending school. | • Outreach and Reengagement: Reengagement Specialists contact out-of-school students (9th through 12th grade) and assist with returning to school. Reengagement Specialists provide a year of follow-up and help problem solve any potential challenges a youth might face. In addition to establishing relationships with these students, they form partnerships with staff at charter, alternative, and traditional schools to ensure youth connect with the best educational fit. | • Futures Academy: Through a partnership with Aurora Public Schools, CYC operates a unique program which provides students who are significantly behind in educational opportunity. Futures provides GED instruction as well as the opportunity to concurrently enroll in Pickens Technical College and Community College of Aurora. Students can finish Futures with a GED, a technical certificate, and an Associate Degree. |
| Educational Intervention: Educational Intervention Specialists provide academic interventions, skill-building, training, tutoring, and advocacy to help off-track 9th grade students pass core courses and earn necessary credits to help them graduate on time. | | |
