
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DEAR FRIENDS.

The 2019-2020 school year was an unprecedented time for Colorado Youth for Change, our students, and programming across the organization. The switch to virtual learning caused by COVID-19 shifted priorities and interventions at CYC in 2020, and we also closed two of our longstanding programs after years of impact across Colorado. Your support ensures that our incredible students remain a priority and that our programming continues to evolve in response to the changing landscape of education.

Our Reengagement and Futures Academy programs continued to reenroll students who dropped out of school. helping over 400 find a new path toward graduation and post-secondary opportunities and increasing retention by 10% over the previous year in the Reengagement program.

Both the Educational Intervention and Corps for a Change programs continued to support high school students struggling with grades and attendance. A new pre and post assessment from the Search Institute was implemented, showing students having the biggest gains in commitment to learning and constructive use of time. The results provide a roadmap for working with students. The Colorado Reading Corps continued to serve over 1.200 Kindergarten to 3rd grade students, pivoting to virtual tutoring in April and providing that one-on-one support to children not reading on grade level.

After 10+ years of programming, both our Educational Intervention and Futures Academy programs came to a close at the end of the school year. Many students supported by Educational Intervention will continue to be supported through Corps for a Change. Many students of Futures Academy will continue to be served by Aurora Public Schools, who built its capacity to serve more students through its alternative program. We remain proud and humbled by all that was accomplished through these programs over the years – including hundreds of graduates and post-secondary success stories.

78% of students that reenrolled in school finished the year with a positive outcome: graduation or continued enrollment into the next school year.

Staff reached out to 3,815 out-of-school youth and helped reenroll 203 students.

39% of students within the target group increased their attendance, compared to an average decline in overall school attendance of 5% over the year.

359 failing classes were recovered and became passing, and 73% of students raised at least one core failing grade.

68% of students achieved more than a full year of

academic growth in reading.

75 students co-enrolled in post-secondary options; 24 earned credit from Pickens Technical College and 33 classes were passed at the Community College of Aurora.

163 students improved at least one text score and 44 earned a GED.
