Dear friends,

In April 2021, Colorado Youth for a Change hosted a virtual panel event entitled <u>Innovation</u> <u>through a Pandemic: What We've Learned and What We'll Carry Forward</u>. One of the panel's AmeriCorps members, Gabriella, made a statement that's been reverberating through our hearts and minds ever since: "This pandemic has really validated the fact that these students are much more than just students; they're siblings, employees, and they're people who are truly pioneering this new way of learning."

Gabriella's statement illustrates the complexities that bubbled up as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and the importance of being flexible in our approach with students. This flexibility was central to our work during the 2020-2021 school year, because every student's experience is unique.

We are grateful for our partnership with AmeriCorps, which allowed flexibility in our programs (Corps for a Change and Colorado Reading Corps), helping CYC to harness the power of service in order to bolster literacy among K-3 students and increase school engagement among high school students. We also launched PreK Reading Corps, and tutors delivered targeted literacy and numeracy interventions to 147 early learners (ages 3-5) for the first time in Colorado. Additional AmeriCorps members were also recruited for our Student Engagement Corps, a one-year project that supported K-12 students and their families with resources (often technology support and access) to remain engaged in school.

Meanwhile, CYC's Reengagement program successfully reenrolled nearly 150 students back into school; 80 percent continued in school or graduated this year. Our team ensured that these students received support and resources to reduce barriers toward graduation.

Thank you for partnering with Colorado Youth for a Change to boost access and create new pathways for student success in Colorado. We remain committed to the changing needs of students and families, and our team could not do this work without the support of our community.



Life Events (ages 14-21 only)

35% of CYC students are currently or formerly involved in the court system

4% are currently or formerly in foster care

18% are currently or formerly experiencing homelessness

9% are parenting or pregnant

69% are-eligible for free or reduced lunch

I had a third grader who had missed a lot of school in kindergarten through second grade and was really behind. This student started third grade not knowing all of their letters and only recognizing three words on the beginning of the year assessment. They were reading at a kindergarten level. Even though we didn't start tutoring regularly until October due to the pandemic, this student made huge progress this year. They went from basically not being able to read at all to reading almost 50 words per minute. As we continued, their confidence shot up and they truly started to enjoy reading and school. Last week, they scored at a second-grade reading level and they are still making progress. They never gave up!


Colorado Reading Corps

Helping students become strong readers by the end of third grade

Over 70% of CYC's Colorado Reading Corps members report that they want to pursue careers in education.

Through the Colorado Reading Corps I learned a great deal about reading strategies and interventions in general that I adapted and used in my own materials with my students. Colorado Pre-K Reading Corps

Launched September 2020





Pre-K Reading Corps sites alternated between in-person and remote learning. During remote learning, tutors shared recorded book readings, distributed book bags and reading kits to families, and supported teacher-led remote learning activities. During in-person learning, tutors were integrated into the classroom and met with every student in the classroom at least once a week to provide small group literacy- and numeracy-based activities. Tutors also provided targeted, one-on-one and small group early literacy and numeracy interventions to 52 students and class wide literacy support to an additional 95. Participants achieved growth in all three skillsets:

Percent of Students Who Met Skill Target

Area of literacy/numeracy	Beginning of year	End of year
Math	26%	74%
Vocabulary	30%	61%
Comprehension	48%	70%



One student and I are working on Blending Words and Phoneme Blending. They said they liked working with me and that they go home and teach their dad how to read using the same interventions we do. They show him words and have him blend sounds together just like I have them do in class! This made my day! The students are taking in what I am teaching them and bringing it home to their families. It is exciting!

Corps for a Change

Increasing school engagement



425 students served



75% improved in at least two asset categories on post-development assessment

CYC's Corps for a Change program served 425 students with 4,898 one-on-one support sessions focused on increasing school engagement, family engagement, and minimizing barriers to education. 75% of students improved in at least two asset categories that impact school success, with the most growth seen in *social competencies* and *commitment to learning*.

80% either graduated or continued in school

Updates to Improve Access

In January 2021, CYC completed a wide-ranging expansion of its website. A major part of the website's renovation was the addition of resources and a scheduling app that simplified the intake process for students seeking to reenroll in school. These changes helped CYC better support students and families, especially those new to our services.

CYC Featured on America's Promise webinar

CYC was honored to participate in a virtual event with America's Promise, a national alliance created to improve the lives and futures of America's youth. Representing CYC was Executive Director Mary Zanotti, Senior AmeriCorps Program Manager Alayna Shaw, AmeriCorps member James, and CYC student Matt.

CYC Launches Student Engagement Corps

In August 2020, CYC partnered with Serve Colorado and the Governor's Office to recruit additional AmeriCorps members through the Student Engagement Corps. Members supported nearly 2,600 students during the 2020-2021 school year, from kindergarten through 12th grade. Roles included attendance support, academic tutoring, supporting social and emotional growth with students, and helping students and families navigate remote learning platforms and communication. Members helped to ensure district communication was translated for families where English may be a second language and created special instructions and supports for entire families.
