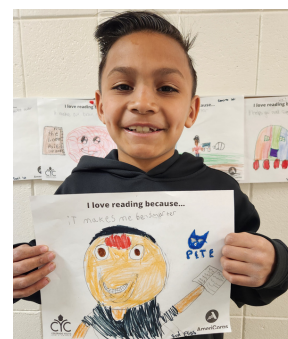
## STUDENT VOICE >
